The curriculum and degrees offered through the Department of Statistics are designed to equip students with decision-making skills for careers as professional statisticians in industrial organizations, government agencies, insurance companies, pharmaceutical companies, universities, and research institutes.</p> <p>The Biostatistics emphasis prepares students to engage in work to advance public health, biology, and medicine. It prepares students for graduate programs in statistics, biostatistics, epidemiology, public health, bioinformatics, and for health sciences professional programs. The Biostatistics emphasis includes the mathematics courses required for graduate study in statistics and biostatistics together with a selection of biology and chemistry courses.</p> <p><b>CAREER OPPORTUNITIES:</b></p> <p>The increase of big data and analytics in personalized medicine, genomics, and bioinformatics is creating new challenges and opportunities for biostatisticians. Students with undergraduate degrees in biostatistics are well-prepared to apply for graduate programs in statistics and</p>

biostatistics but they also stand out as applicants to medical and dental schools and residencies. Statistical training prepares these students to take part in basic and clinical research during medical or dental school and residency.

### CERTIFICATION:
